GREATER BETHEL'S LIVING LEGENDS

BRO. ROBERT ROBERTS

Mr. Robert Roberts was raised in New Jersey. He attended East Orange High School

and graduated in 1957. He then attended Newark State College.

He has worked at the following places: US Census Department, Ford Motor Company, and United Parcel Service.

He married Ruth Elizabeth Boston whom he met in high school and they have two daughters and a son. Mr. Roberts is the grandfather of four grandsons and three granddaughters.

He chose a career in law enforcement. Mr. Roberts was a member of the East Orange Police Department in East Orange, New Jersey. He graduated from the Essex County Police Academy in Verona, New Jersey and he is also an FBI National Academy graduate in the 131st Session at Quantico, Virginia.

He was the Commander of a task force in the apprehension of a serial murderer. Mr. Roberts attained the rank of Captain and retired after thirty years of service.

He then became the Security Director for the East Orange Public School System.

The Roberts relocated to Chesapeake, Virginia where he joined Mt. Zion AME Church in Virginia Beach, VA. They later transferred to Greater Bethel AME Church in 2001, where he has served in various roles. Class Leader, Trustee, Trustee ProTem, Steward, Sons of Allen member, member of the Young at Heart, auxiliary member of the Equippers and a member of the GBAME Male Chorus. He also sang with the Greater Bethel Mass Choir.



On November 18th, I travelled to Brunswick, GA, to do what I do daily and throughout the day. I received an invitation, along with about one hundred other pastors, to come and simply pray for and with Wanda Cooper-Jones and Marcus Arbery, the parents of Ahmad Arbery. It is normal for pastors to pray with family during times of bereavement and legal proceedings. However, this prayer meeting and pastoral concern caused international attention. The defense attorney, Kevin Gough, made daily attempts to exclude "black pastors" from the courtroom. He made the statement, "We don't want any more Black pastors in here," and asked the judge to ban the Revs. Al Sharpton and Jesse Jackson; the judge refused the demand.

More than one thousand pastors, imams, rabbis, and faith leaders responded to Attorney Gough by showing up to pray for the family, and this pastor was one of them. While there, I was interviewed by a few media outlets as to why I would attend. My response was quite simple, this is what I am called to do. Also, in the climate of our nature I am concerned about our black and brown children. The Civil Rights movement was birthed in the black church, and we must remain loud and vigilant in the continued struggle against injustice.



On Sunday, July 11, 2021, the Connectional Lay Organization (CLO) of the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church made history by electing its first-ever African President, **Mr. Matikane Abednego Makiti.** This historic event took place at the 37th Biennial Convention held in Orlando, Florida and Cape Town, South, Africa respectively (the election was held virtually in various parts of Africa and Canada). Makiti is from the 19th Episcopal District, which encompasses Orangia, Natal, M. M. Mokone Memorial, East and West Annual Conferences in the Republic of South Africa (RSA).

Despite the virus only being identified in 1984, more than 35 million people have died of HIV or AIDS related illnesses, making it one of the most destructive pandemics in history.

Today, scientific advances have been made in HIV treatment, there are laws to protect people living with HIV and we understand so much more about the condition. Despite this, each year several thousand people are diagnosed with HIV and people do not know the facts about how to protect themselves and others. Stigma and discrimination remain a reality for many people living with the condition.

World AIDS Day is important because it reminds the public and government that HIV has not gone away – there is still a vital need to raise money, increase awareness, fight prejudice and improve education.


Operation Sandwiches



If You See Coins Piled On A Grave, This Is What It Means



You might see coins at some graves. But don't touch them if you catch sight of these items. They've been left to commemorate fallen veterans. You might notice that they're specific denominations: pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters. And there's a reason for those precise coins to be left on American tombstones.

For example, it's said that **pennies** are left by those who didn't serve when they visit the graves of somebody who did. This just lets everyone know that a visitor stopped by. And a **nickel** has a more personal meaning. Yes, it tells other visitors that you underwent basic training with the person you're honoring.

Dimes show a closer relationship. They demonstrate that you both served together. Yet that's nothing compared to a **quarter**. Those show that you were

there when the person whose grave you're visiting lost their life. So, the impact on a relative if they spot a **quarter** on a tombstone must be enormous.

We can't be certain when this tradition started, but there's an answer that seems to fit: it could've been during the Vietnam War. Given how disliked that war proved to be, vets spending time at their brothers in arms' graves might've ended in trouble. So just quietly dropping a coin could have been a memorial that didn't invite any conflict.

And there was even more to it than that. The coins were viewed as a way to shout a round for those who'd died, in the hope that one day you'd enjoy that drink with one another in the hereafter.

National Council of Churches USA Announces Clergy Student Loan Debt Forgiveness Webinar



The National Council of Churches is co-hosting a session on Student Loan Forgiveness on Friday, December 3, 2021, at 2:00 PM ET with the United Church of Christ.

Attorney Ashley Harrington, a senior-level official from the Federal Student Aid office of the US Department of Education, will go through the process of consolidation of loans, public service loan forgiveness, and other methods to reduce and/or eliminate student loan debt for all, including religious workers and clergy.

At the Christian Unity Gathering last month, the NCCUSA sponsored a Meet-Up on Student Loan Forgiveness. It is offering this opportunity again through Zoom for greater access. Registration is now open. This information is especially critical for clergy in our church. Please spread.
